International Museum Day 2011 toured the world

The 2011 edition: a rave success

The theme, Museum and Memory: Objects tell your story, brought together more than 30,000 museums in 100 countries across five continents for International Museum Day, which took place around 18, May. The International Council of Museums (ICOM) has organised this event since 1977 and saw record attendance for this 2011 edition. Due to the scope of this year's theme, ICOM joined forces with numerous institutional partners, all concerned with the preservation of cultural and natural heritage.

Museum and Memory: Objects tell your story

All around the world, museums showed extra creativity in the organisation of activities that emphasise the role of museums and their collections in preserving and transmitting collective and individual memory. In Africa, the Nigerian National Museum in Oshogbo organised a quiz intended for school pupils in order to raise their awareness of the importance of heritage conservation, whereas in the United States, the MUSEUM TREKKER organised a photography competition. In New Zealand, the Whanganui Regional Museum celebrated the musical traditions of the country through its programme *Memory and Music.* In Argentina, the *Museo Argentino de Ciencias Naturales Bernardino Ridavia* in Buenos Aires created the concept *musecuentos* for the event, where storytellers recounted tales inspired by objects in the museum. Finally, the *Arkeologi Museoa* in Bilbao, Spain organised a game called - On the tracks of past - for its visitors, followed by a show. Several museums also offered free entry and some continue to celebrate International Museum Day.

Created in 1946, ICOM (International Council of Museums) is an international non-governmental organisation maintaining formal relations with UNESCO. - International public service missions, committed to fighting illicit traffic in cultural property and developing emergency response programmes for situations of natural disaster or armed conflict
