Pacific Cultures

Architecture – build your own Tjibaou Culture Centre.



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Focus on the Temporary Exhibition

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Interview of the Month

Pedro Wendler, Director of Brazil Pavilion at the Shanghai World Expo, presented two sessions of traditional music show with the group Chico Lobo from the Minas Gerais region on 11 August, 2010 in ICOM Pavilion.

How did you enjoy the Chico Lobo show at the ICOM Pavilion?

I didn't know Chico Lobo before the Shanghai Expo. It was a beautiful surprise for me to meet such fantastic musicians. I didn't know that acoustic music had a soul until I saw Chico Lobo performing. They make the soul of acoustic guitar sing. What they took to the ICOM Pavilion was the spirit of those who live in the Brazilian countryside. It was very touching, not only for me, but also for those visitors who were there enjoying the beautiful melody.

What was your most unforgettable experience at the ICOM Pavilion?

For me it was to look at the faces of the visitors during Chico Lobo's performance. At some moments there was even a silence as if time had stopped; the world was left with nothing but melody. And when the performance was over, the silence was broken by the crowd's applause, showing their appreciation and recognition.

What is a real museum experience for you?

I like visiting museums very much and a real museum experience for me is catharsis. When I go to a museum, I expect to learn and to change the way I see things. I am witnessing and broadening my personal horizons. A good interactive museum experience should not only influence the visual sense, but also have an effect on all five senses: it can carry you from past to future.

Which is your favourite museum?

I have had the opportunity of visiting the British Museum several times. I know almost their entire permanent exhibition. I am quite impressed by their way of telling ancient history with their priceless collections from countries like Persia, Egypt, Macedonia, etc. These ancient cultures are brought to life right in front of our eyes.
