

INTRODUCTION

The International Council of Museums (ICOM) is proud to present the 2023 annual report, highlighting our progress and achievements aligned with the Strategic Plan (2022-2028). This year, we strengthened ICOM's global presence, governance, financial stability, communication, diversity, and sustainability efforts. At the G20 Culture Ministers Meeting in India, we advocated for the role of museums in cultural preservation and sustainable development, resulting in the <u>Varanasi Declaration</u>. Our collaboration with ICOMOS, Blue Shield, ICA, and IFLA reinforced heritage protection efforts, establishing partnerships that led to the 2024 <u>declaration on protecting cultural property during armed conflicts</u>.

We updated ICOM's Statutes and Rules for better organisational coherence. The President welcomed Medea Ekner as Director General (interim) and Eunice Baez Sanchez as Vice-Chairperson of the Advisory Council. Digital initiatives like the digitisation of the ICOM archives and the ICOM podcast expanded our reach to new audiences. ICOM's Membership base grew to 57,208, an increase of 11.5%.

We launched the <u>ICOM Award for Sustainable Development Practice in Museums</u>, the first global award recognising innovative initiatives and exemplary museum practices in sustainable development. This award aligns with ICOM's 2019 Kyoto Resolution on sustainability and Agenda 2030, promoting sustainable development in museums worldwide.

International Museum Day 2023 focused on the theme of <u>Museums, Sustainability and Wellbeing</u>, emphasising the crucial role museums play in supporting the wellbeing and sustainable development of our communities. Museums contribute to the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals by supporting climate action, fostering inclusivity, tackling social isolation, and improving mental health.

2023 has been a year of proactive engagement and achievements.

We remain committed to our Strategic Plan and thank you for your continued trust and support.

ADVOCACY AND COLLABORATION


ICOM continued advocate for museums on an international level in 2023, representing the interests of the museum sector at high-level gatherings such as the 2023 G20 Culture Ministers Meeting in Varanasi, India, and COP28 in Dubaï for the adoption of a framework policy to recognise culture as a contributor in climate action. Through strategic statements, policy briefs, and collaborative initiatives, ICOM addressed pivotal issues such as the evolving definition of museums, the ethical implications of cultural exchange and repatriation, and the preservation of intangible cultural heritage.

By fostering dialogue, cooperation, and mutual respect among diverse stakeholders, including governments, cultural institutions, indigenous communities and partners such as **IFLA**, **ICA**, **ICOMOS**, and **ICCROM**, ICOM reinforced its commitment to excellence in museum practices, ethical stewardship of cultural heritage, and the promotion of cultural diversity and intercultural dialogue on a global scale. It highlights the importance of specialised international organisations like ICOM in the implementation of international standards for the protection of heritage and in reinforcing dialogue, solidarity and international cooperation. As in the **Statement concerning Israel and Palestine**, ICOM stands firm in its commitment to preserve cultural heritage.

STRENGTHENING COOPERATION

Throughout 2023, ICOM remained steadfast in its commitment to foster inclusivity, equity, and sustainability within the museum community. For instance, by being part of the founding signatories and supporters of the 'Global Call to Action to Put Cultural Heritage, Arts, and Creative Sectors at the Heart of Climate Action' launched by the Climate Heritage Network.

ICOM took a number of actions in relation to decolonisation including the **Museum International issue "Towards Decolonisation"**, featuring diverse perspectives from indigenous peoples, curators, and museum professionals. With the interest generated by this issue, Museum International has seen a 36% increase in downloads, reaching 77,032 downloads in 2023.

Upholding principles of human rights, we endeavored to ensure that museums are inclusive spaces, accessible and welcoming to all members of society, regardless of background or identity. By championing **diversity**, **equity**, **and inclusion**, we sought to create environments where every individual feels valued, represented, and empowered to engage with cultural heritage in meaningful ways.

TRAINING INITIATIVES

In 2023, ICOM organised multiple training and exchange initiatives to support museum professionals worldwide. Key programs included the ICOM-ITC workshops in March and November, focusing on conservation, exhibition development, and museum education. Regional training sessions in Africa, the Middle East, and the Asia-Pacific region addressed museum management, digitalization, and disaster risk management. Additionally, ICOM provided online webinars and e-learning courses on museum ethics, inclusive practices, and use of technology in museums. A notable professional exchange was the Germany-Zambia exchange programme, where a German museum professional spent 20 days at the Livingstone Museum in Zambia.

By nurturing a vibrant community of practice and providing avenues for ongoing learning and collaboration, ICOM strengthened the capacity of museum professionals to meet the evolving challenges of the field with confidence and expertise.

GOVERNANCE UPDATES

As the landscape of cultural heritage governance continued to evolve, ICOM embarked on a journey of transition in 2023. The <u>adoption of new statutes</u> and the establishment of <u>two new International Committees</u> marked significant milestones in our organisational development.

With the appointment of Medea Ekner, former Vice-Chairperson of the Advisory Council, as Director General (interim) and the formation of dynamic working groups and standing committees, ICOM positioned itself to navigate emerging challenges and capitalise on new opportunities in pursuit of its mission.

Through transparent and inclusive governance processes, ICOM sought to foster a culture of innovation, collaboration, and excellence across all levels of the organisation.


The theme for the 2023 International Museum Day edition was Museums, Sustainability and Wellbeing.

Museums are key contributors to the wellbeing and to the sustainable development of our communities. As trusted institutions and important threads in our shared social fabric, they are uniquely placed to create a cascading effect to foster positive change.

As highlighted in the ICOM Resolution "On sustainability and the implementation of Agenda 2030, Transforming our World" (Kyoto, 2019), all museums have a role to play in shaping and creating sustainable futures, and they can do this through educational programmes, exhibitions, community outreach and research.

Each year since 2020, International Museum Day is underpinned by the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals. In 2023, we focused on:

- Goal 3 Global Health and Wellbeing
- Goal 13 Climate Action
- Goal 15 Life on Land

ICOM's membership dues reached €4,667,850 in 2023, representing an increase of 12.6%.


This increase is mainly due to the growth in membership numbers to **57,208 in 2023.**

In 2023, ICOM received a total amount of €736,355, from:

- European Research Executive Agency (REA): €262,625
- Subsidy from National Committee ICOM GREECE concerning the « ICOM Red List of Greek Cultural Objects and Risk »: €15,000
- Subsidy from the Pegaso University, for the «Conference on Museums, Technology and the Future of Cultural Heritage »: €16,350
- Donations from the ICOM Foundation: €300,000
- Financial support from the Getty Foundation for the International Committee ICOM-CC annual conference: €74,000
- Financial support from the Getty Foundation for the International Committee CIDOC annual conference: €41,395
- Financial support for hiring apprentices : €8,000


